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A Non-Programmers Guide to Using Macros

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What are Macros?

Macros are simply a collection of Visual Basic for Applications (VBA, a simplified version of Visual Basic) code that allows the application (in this case Inventor) to perform complex actions automatically with limited user input. An example of a macro might be a program that inserts multiple parts into an assembly document or even simply a toolbar button that accesses a menu command that does not have a default toolbar button.

There are two main categories of custom programs for Inventor. The first is add-ins (or add-ons). These are more complex programs written in true Visual Basic that often insert a new menu item or toolbar button automatically into Inventor. Examples of add-ins are [Animator](#), [Kwik-Sert](#), [iPropWizard](#), [iAssembly Tools](#) etc.. These add-ins need no setup as they are often EXEs and install themselves automatically into the Inventor application.

The second is macros (which are by default *.ivb files) which are nothing more than ASCII text files that tell Inventor to perform certain actions. They do not install menu items or come with default toolbar buttons but can be assigned to buttons. This document will deal with how to use these types of Macros.

Macros access the Inventor application via a conduit called the Application Programming Interface (API). This tutorial will not discuss how to write macros but rather how to use the ones that currently exist. You can download many macros free of charge at the following sites:

How to Use Macros

Let's first find a macro we want to use. A good one to have in your arsenal is Kent Keller's Obround (Slot) macro. It creates a sketch of a slot that can be then cut-extruded to form a punched slot.

Go to <http://www.kwikmcad.com/icode/macros/obround/nfobround.asp> and click on the download icon. Save the file to disk and unzip it into a folder.

TIP: Many of us who write Add-ins and macros have agreed on a common folder to store these files. It is suggested you store all your macros in the following folder:

C:\Program Files\Autodesk\Macros

If you have installed any add-ins you likely already have this folder created. If you do not, create it and place the **obround.ivb file in this location.**

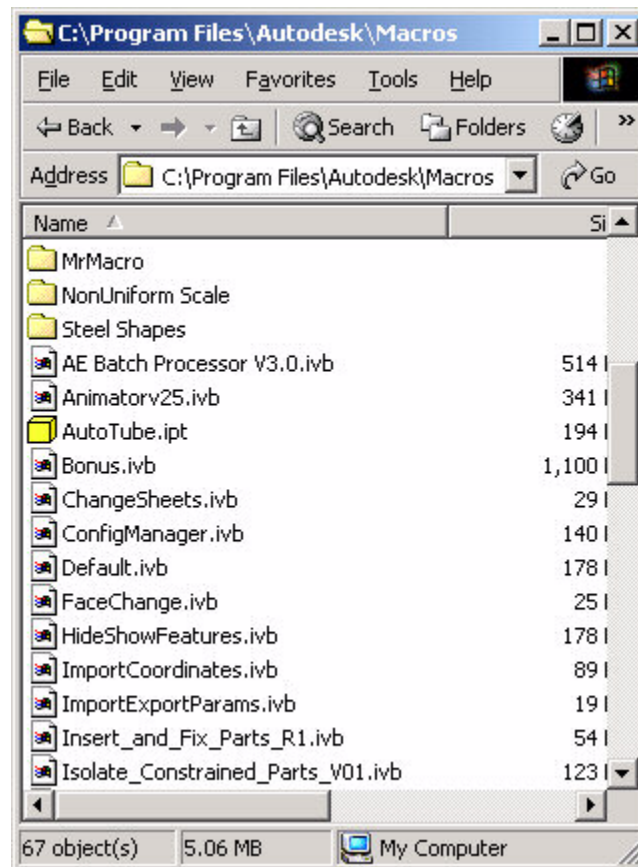


Figure 1 - Common Macros Folder

There are several ways to load and run Macros. We will look at 3 ways.

Method One: Loading Individual Macros

Start up Inventor and click on **Tools>Macro>Visual Basic Editor**

You will be presented with the Visual Basic Editing environment. Click on **File>Load Project** and browse to the folder when you unzipped the **obround.ivb** file. (e.g. **C:\Program Files\Autodesk\Macros**)

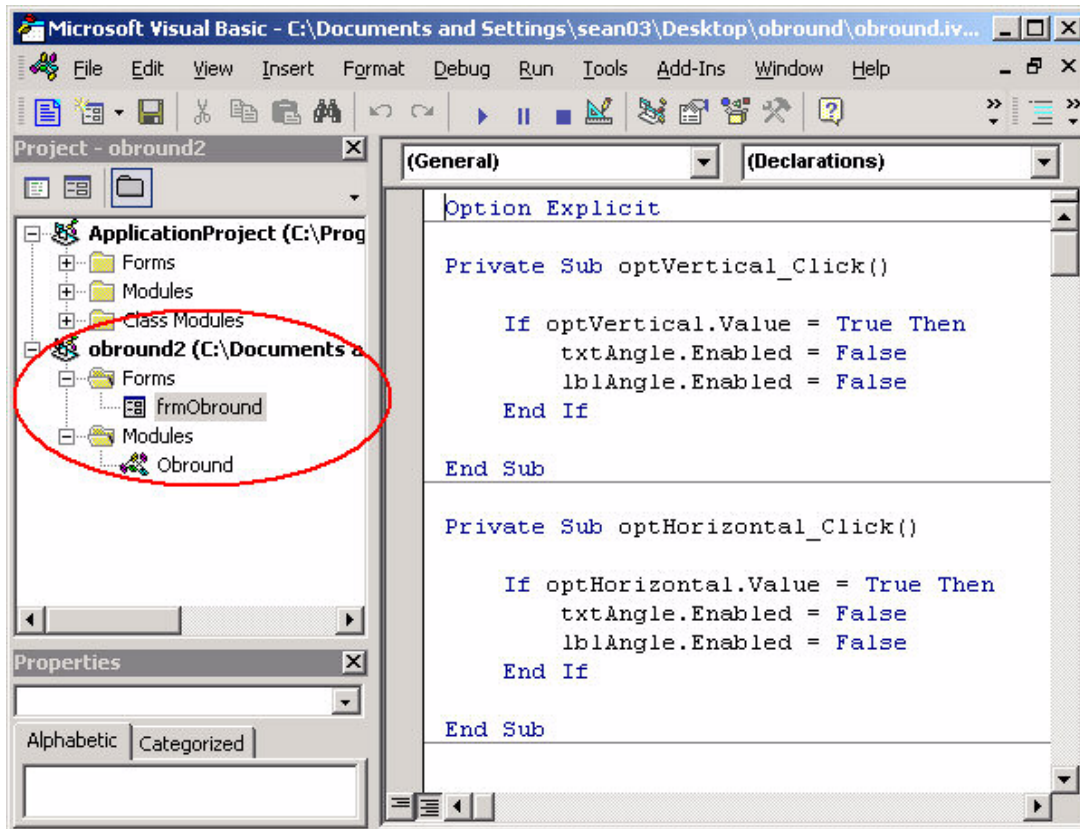


Figure 2 - Code Loaded into the VB Editor

The code from the macro will be loaded into the VB editor. (See Figure 2)

Exit the VB Editor (**File>Close**) and return to the Inventor modeling interface.

Start a new part file and create a simple extruded block. Now create a new sketch on a surface of the block.

We are now ready to run the macro code. Select **Tools>Macro>Macros**. You will see a dialogue like the one below.

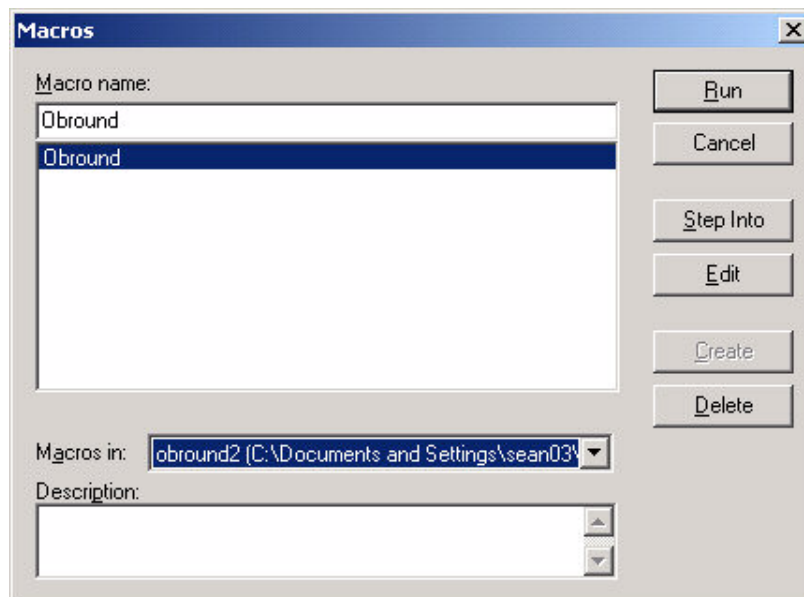


Figure 3 - Run Macro Dialogue

If you do not see the Obround Macro listed in the top textbox, choose the pulldown and select **All Active Application Projects and Documents**.

Find the Obround macro in the top text box, select it and click **Run**.

Fill in the values you desire in the dialogue and click Create. The obround sketch has been created. You can now position it by dimensioning to the sketch point at the center of the obround.

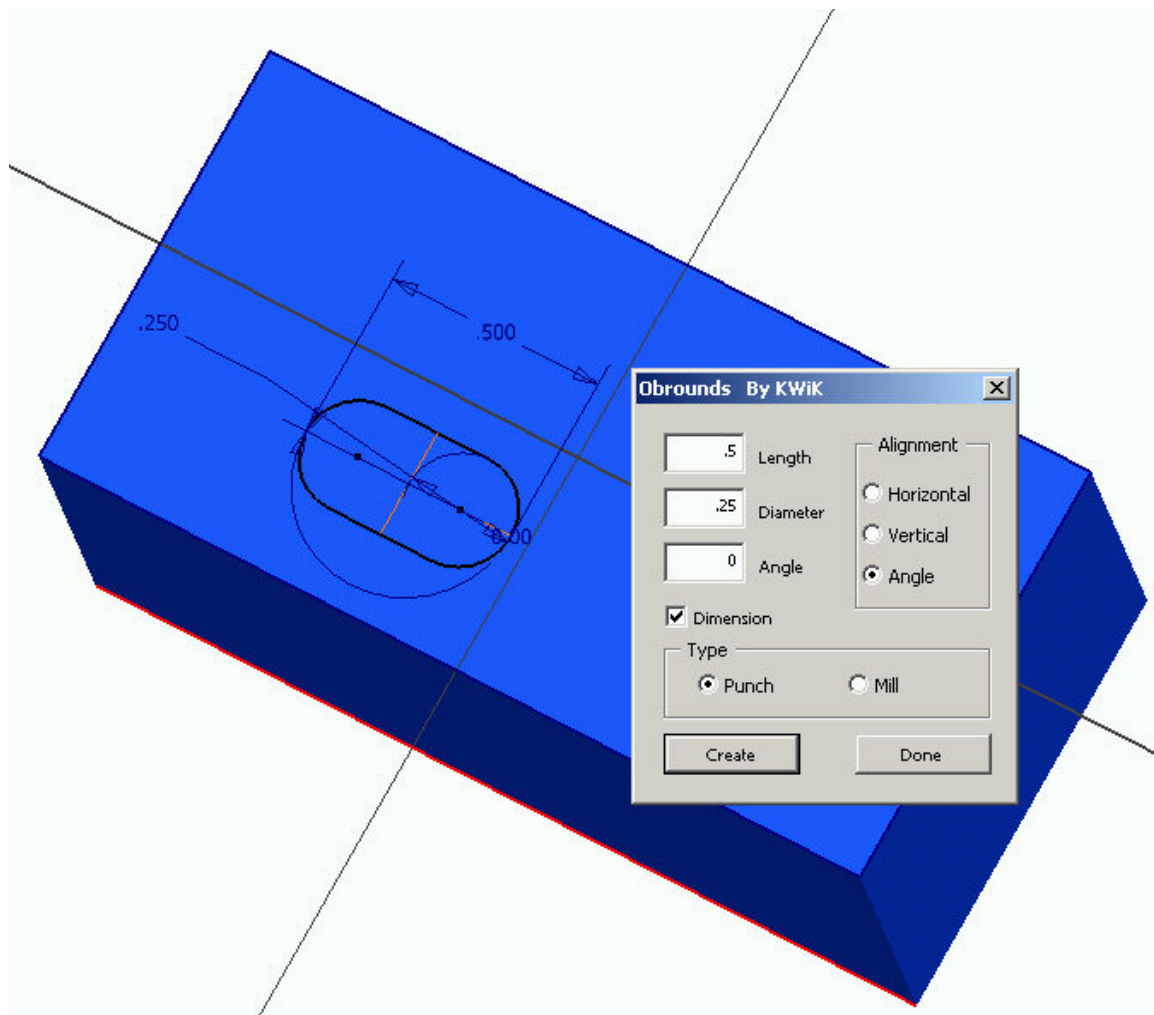


Figure 4 - Creating the Obround

You can now download, load and run other macros in this fashion. Keep in mind that the macro stays loaded in memory as long as the Inventor session is open. If you close (or crash) Inventor you will need to repeat the loading procedure.

While this procedure is effective for macros you may only use one in a while it is not very helpful for macros you want to have available all of the time. The next method shows you an easier way to load and run these macros.

Method Two: Using Mr. Macro

Loading Macros via the VBE can be a semi-tedious process. A much easier way to load macros is to use an add-on created by Charles Bliss. Go to <http://www.cbliss.com/inventor/iCode/index.htm> and download **Mr. Macro**.

Close Inventor and install it following the supplied directions. Restart Inventor and you will now see a new menu item “Mr. Macro”

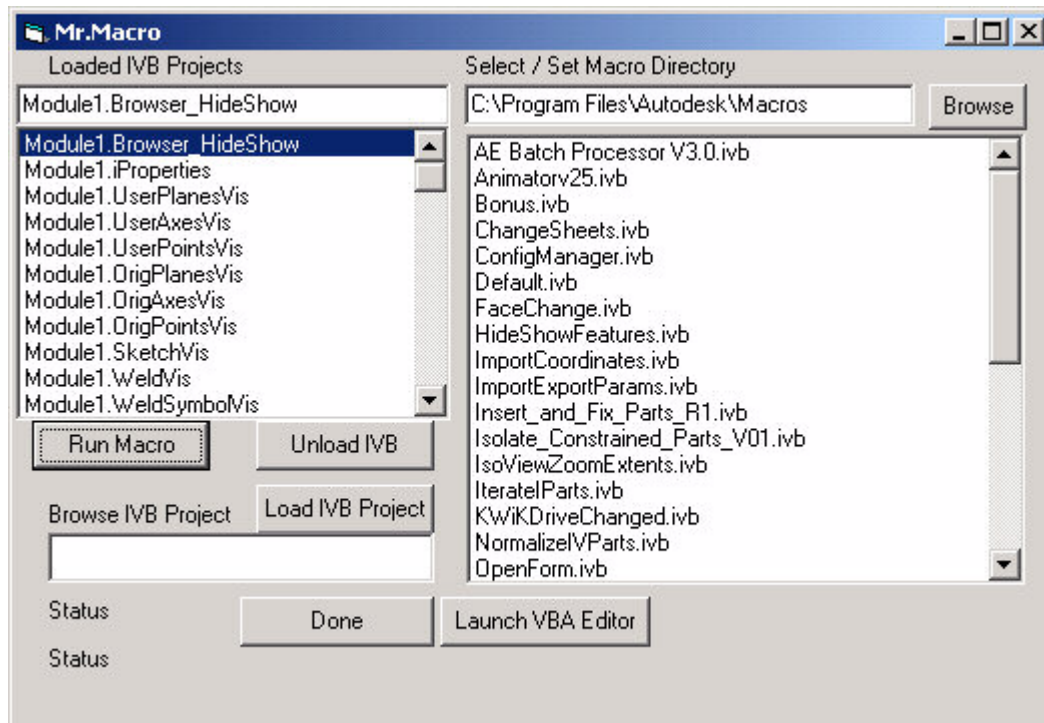


Figure 5 - Mr. Macro Dialogue

Click on Mr. Macro >Load/ Run Macros. The dialogue will appear (Figure 5)

In the top right you set the active directory. As suggested before, place all of your IVB files in the **C:\Program Files\Autodesk\Macros** directory. Click the browse button and set the working directory. Mr. Macro will remember this directory each time you use the program.

In the list box to the right are all of the available IVB files in this directory.

In the left hand pane is the list of actively loaded macros. In this example you will see I have lots of macros named Module1.* (we will discuss these later).

To load a macro, select it from the list on the right and click **Load IVB Project** (or simply double click on the macro). To run the macro, select it in the left-hand pane and click **Run Macro**. The macro will then run in Inventor and Mr. Macro will close.

From The Mr. Macro dialogue you can also unload macros and open them in the VB Editor.

As you can see this is an easier method to run macros that you may need occasionally. All the macros are in one convenient spot and you do not have to enter the VB editing environment. However, for macros that you run very frequently you will want to look into the third method.

Method Three: Using the Default.ivb File

The third method is the most complex but once you master it, it allows you to have instant access to all of your macros via toolbar buttons.

To begin this process start Inventor and navigate to **Tools>Application Options>File**

In the **Default VBA Project** area note the name and location of the IVB file. By default when you install Inventor it should be pointing to

C:\Program Files\Autodesk\Inventor X\Bin\Macros\Default.ivb where **X** is your Inventor version. (e.g 6, 7, 8)

NOTE: Once you understand the process you may want to copy the default.ivb into your C:\Program Files\Autodesk\Macros\ directory and change the Application Options to point to this new file.

This is an empty macro file (IVB) that is loaded each time you start Inventor. Any macro placed into this file will be loaded on startup.

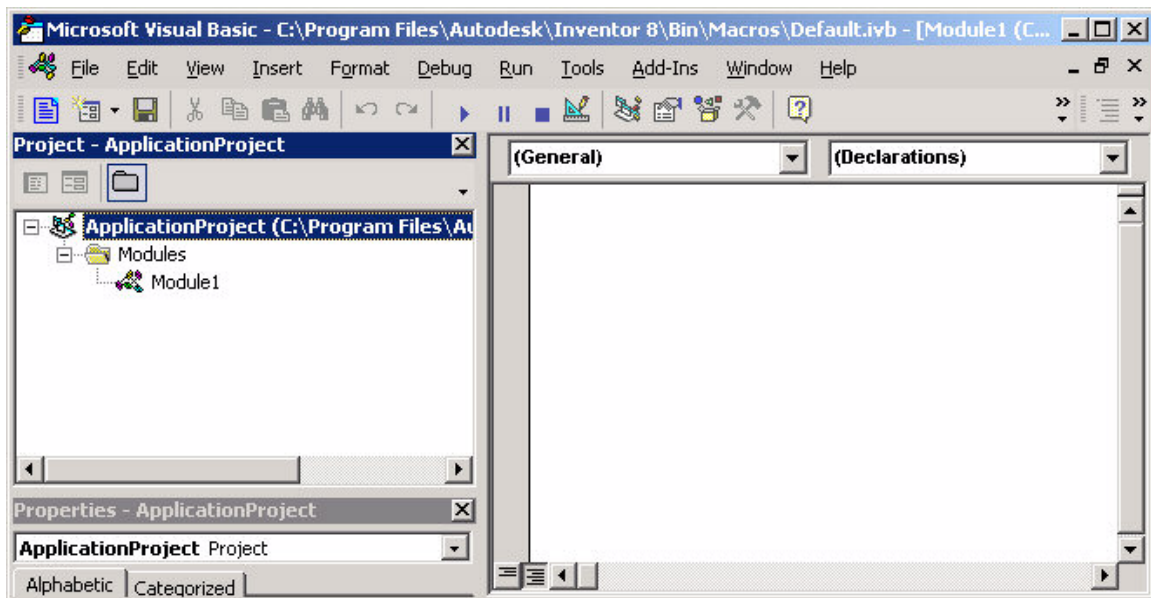


Figure 6 - Default.ivb in the VB Editor

Close the applications options dialogue and open the VB Editor (VBE) as explained above. If you have never used the default.ivb file when you load the VBE you will see only one module under the Default.ivb project. (see Figure 6).

At this point you can type in your own code or take code from other macros (the focus of this tutorial) and put them into this default IVB.

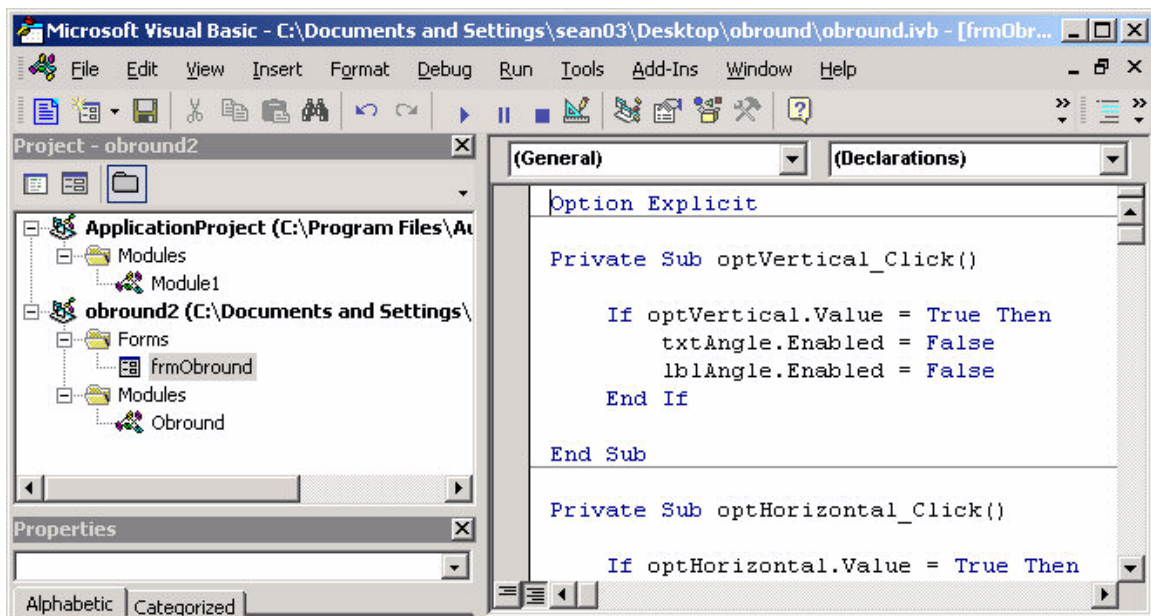


Figure 7 - Obround.ivb Loaded

Load the obround.ivb file as we did in the first part of this tutorial. You should now see 2 projects in the left hand pane. Expand all the + signs. (see Figure 7)

We now want to take the code from obround.ivb and place it into our default.ivb. To do this simply drag the icon of frmObround on top of the default.ivb project. A PLUS sign

on the cursor should appear indicating that the information is being copied. Do this for the Obround module as well. If there were other modules or forms we'd copy these in as well.

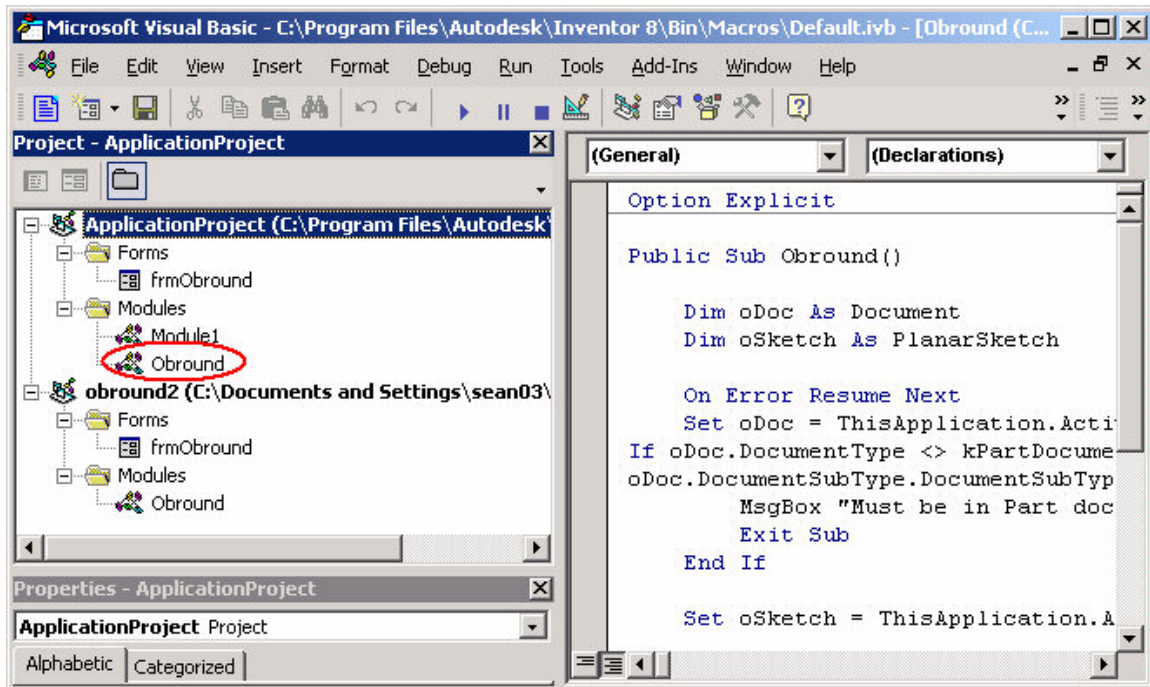


Figure 8 - Obround code copied into Default.ivb

Your default.ivb should now contain 2 modules and one form as shown in Figure 8.

NOTE: If you come across macros that contain a module named Module 1 you can also select the code in the right hand pane then paste it into Module1 in the default.ivb. I find this useful for macros that only contain a small amount of code.

Before closing the VBE, click on the Obround module in the default.ivb (the one circled in red above). Note the name of the subroutine in the right hand pane. You need to find the name of the PUBLIC subroutine. As we can see this one is named Obround. The module is also named Obround. You will need to know this info for the next section.

Unload the obround.ivb by selecting it then selecting File/Unload Project. You do not need to save changes. We do this just so you won't have two copies of code loaded at the same time.

Click save and then close the VBE. You can run the macro by selecting it in Tools>Macro>Macros method or via Mr. Macro. However there is a much easier method of running the macros that exist in your default.ivb.

Creating Macro Toolbuttons

You can make icons for your macros to be used in toolbars. First you will need to create a BMP image of the icon. MSPaint is a perfect application for this process. For small icons the size is 15 x 16 (high x wide). For large icons it's 22 x 24. If you only use small icons you do not have to make a large icon.

You can use transparency in the icons by defining the transparent color in the lower right pixel. Anything this color (I suggest using one of the basic colors) will not show up in the icon.

There are large and small icons one each illustrating the transparent process and one each that is blank with which you can experiment.

Once you have the icons save them to the same directory as the macro (e.g. **C:\Program Files\Autodesk\Inventor X\Bin\Macros\Default.ivb** or **C:\Program Files\Autodesk\Macros**) and name them according to the following formula:

ModuleName.SubName.Size.bmp

Where **ModuleName** is the name of the module in the macro, **SubName** is the subroutine name and size is either **Small** or **Large**.

In our case the name would be: **Obround.Obround.Small.bmp**

If you had a sub named Test in the Module1 module then the name would be: **Module1.Test.Small.bmp**

Once the icon has been created, the next step is to assign it to a toolbar.

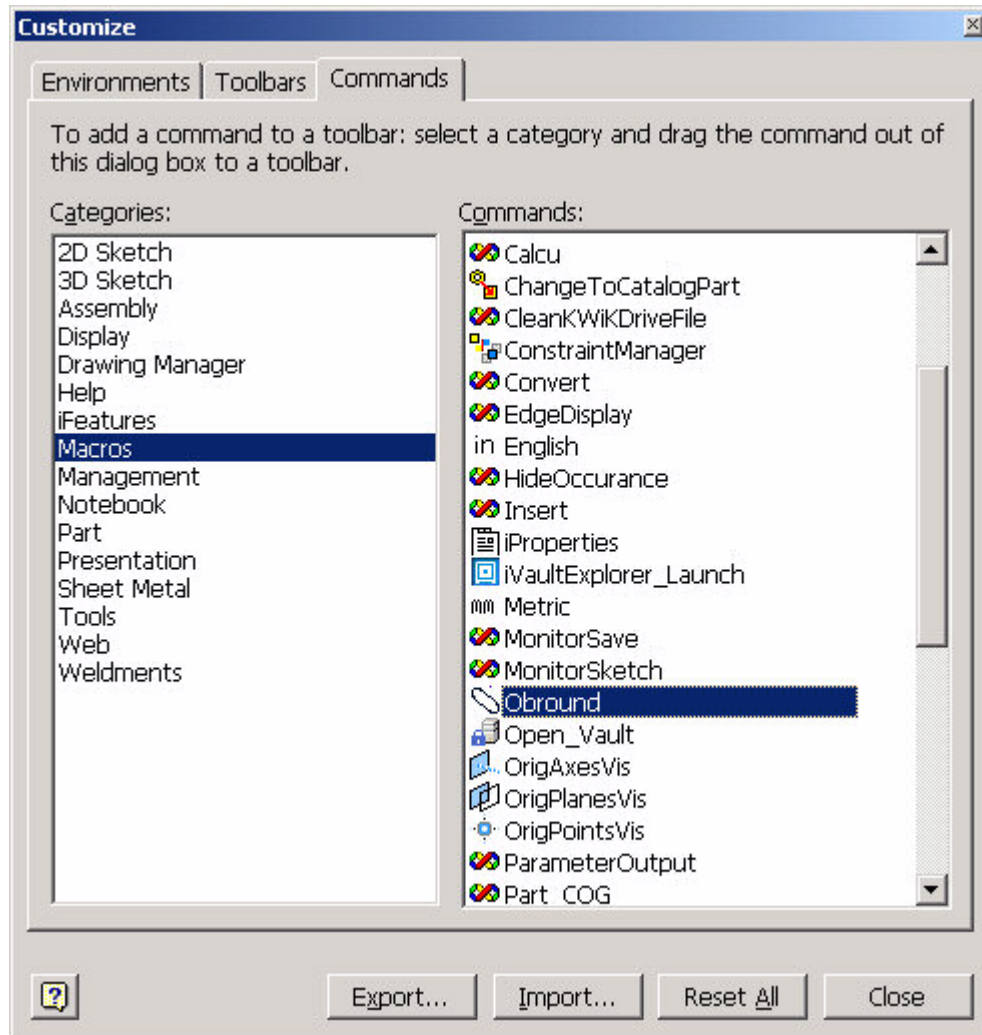


Figure 9 - Available Macros

Go to **Tools>Customize>Commands**. Select Macros. In the right pane you should see all Macros that are in your default.ivb file. (see Figure 9)

The macro should have the custom icon next to it. If it shows an infinity symbol (a mobius strip looking object, like the one next to **Convert**) then your BMP is either in the wrong location, is named incorrectly or you do not have an icon for this macro. Now simply drag the icon onto a toolbar and existing toolbar or one you have created).

I suggest creating a new toolbar specifically for your macros as it makes it's easy to export these toolbars via the Export command for making your customization portable.

Exit this dialogue and click on your newly created tool button. It should fire off the Macro.
